The exam will have true/false, multiple choice, and matching questions. Your knowledge of DECA is essential for the questions you will receive if you become a state leadership team member/ambassador for the organization. Be prepared!

The state leadership exam will be taken during State Leadership Team Screening on Saturday, January 28, at Brownsburg High School.

You must have a score of at least 70 out of 100 on the written exam to be considered for candidacy. The exam score will then be averaged with your interview scores, and you need a combined score of at least 70% to become an officer candidate.

Chartered Associations

Consist of local school chapters within a state, province, territory, or equivalent geographic unit and perform four (4) basic functions:

- 1. Act as a unifying body by providing an opportunity for the chapters to work and plan together on a state-wide association basis.
- 2. Set standards which local chapters must meet before a charter can be granted.
- 3. Act as a clearinghouse for information and ideas that will benefit DECA locally, associationwide, and nationally/internationally.
- 4. Act as a liaison between DECA Inc. and chapters in carrying out programs and projects.
